







Hon. Harjit Singh Sajjan, MND [top priorities]



Work with the Minister of Foreign Affairs to **renew** Canada's commitment to United Nations peace operations. This includes:

- making Canada's specialized capabilities from mobile medical teams, to engineering support, to aircraft that can carry supplies and personnel – available on a case-by-case basis;
- working with the Minister of Foreign Affairs to help the United Nations respond more quickly to emerging and escalating conflicts and providing well-trained personnel to international initiatives that can be quickly deployed, such as mission commanders, staff officers, and headquarters units; and
- leading an international effort to improve and expand the **training** of military and civilian personnel deployed on peace operations, while insisting that any peacekeepers involved in misconduct be held accountable by their own country and the United Nations.







Training

- CAF does less than ¼ training than decade ago
- PPC closed 2013





Recommendations

- 1: Revive selected peacekeeping courses & exercises abandoned
- 2: Develop **new** training materials & mechanisms
- 3: Create a new peace operations **centre** for integrated training civilians, military and the police
- 4: Integrate peace operations prep into CAF institutional culture
- 5: Develop training materials across wide range of topics

Competitive Advantage



- Multicultural mosaic
- Bilingual civil service and military
- Example of democracy, rule of law, minority rights protection
- Women, peace and security
- Member: five eyes, NATO, Francophonie, Commonwealth
- Reputation for UN service (enduring despite last decade)
 - Peacekeeping forces, protection of civilians, human security
- Free from colonial baggage & Great Powers resentment
- Modern military, updating in training

Challenges

- Deploying with developing nations
- Navigating the UN system
 - Under-staffed, under-resourced
- Lack of recent experience
- Lack of PSO-specific training
- Skepticism and snobbery

Myths & Realities

Myths

- Combat training is sufficient
- Peace operations are easy
- UN is ineffective
- There is no peace to keep

Realities

- Challenging operations, wide-ranging skills needed
 - MAPRO, Arrest operations
- Mission creep
- Meet the threats at their source: atrocities, refugees, diseases and terrorism
